

A MESSAGE FROM REV. LAURA SHENNUM

Holy Curiosity...

"The best way to find out if you can trust somebody is to trust them." - Ernest Hemingway

A MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD PRESIDENT

Seek, Embrace, Serve

My dear friends,

As we are in our Stewardship Campaign, I thought I would answer some of the questions that you might have regarding the budget and how the Board came to recommend it. Much of the financial discussion the past year has been dominated by discussions regarding the utilization of the north lot, the need to retire the mortgage on that lot in August 2019, and investigations of a capital campaign to redevelop the existing CUUF property site (north and south lots together, which are actually four lots all told).



During that process an architect developed a detailed plan for a redevelopment effort, followed by a financial feasibility study conducted by Kay Crider of the Pacific Northwest Region. The results of that study indicate that CUUF does not have the fund-raising capacity to build the architect's proposed new facilities on CUUF's existing sites.

At this time, the CUUF Board is reevaluating all options, and has engaged a realtor to assess whether an existing property might be available in our area that might better meet our needs. In addition, an investigation is underway to identify options for refinancing the existing north lot mortgage to resolve that issue when the note comes due. The Board will also go back to the architect and see what revisions can be made that are within our budget of approximately \$750,000 (what the Financial Feasibility Study estimated we could raise in a 3-year capital campaign). We have reached out to local churches looking for available space.

Therefore, unless the options available to us change dramatically, there are no plans to launch a capital campaign at the present, and you can determine your stewardship pledge without having to consider a capital campaign request during Fiscal Year 2018/2019.

Proposed CUUF Budget Fiscal Year 2018/2019:

Overview:

The budget for the upcoming fiscal year reflects a clear focus of investment in CUUF; investment in our staff, our members, and our mission within the Wenatchee Valley.

Personnel Category

Personnel expenses increase by \$13,937 from last year.

This is a result of the Board's decision to move staff salaries toward the UUA's mid-range recommendations. This includes a 5% increase for our minister, modest increases for the office Assistant and RE director, as well a minimum wage driven increases for yard care and day care. In addition, the RE director's hours are increased from 10 hours per week to 15 hours per week, in line with the desire to increase CUUF's investment in Religious Education.

The largest increase in this category is funding to hire a Ministerial Intern for \$6,525. This is partly in response to our Minister's upcoming Sabbatical Leave. Per contract, and accepted practice, Reverend Laura will be absent for 3 months during this period of reflection, personal/professional renewal, and study.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD PRESIDENT (continued)

The Board considered three options to fill this ministerial absence.

- 1. Have only lay led services and fellowship support.
- 2. Hire a "Sabbatical Minister" to fill the gap.
- 3. Hire a Ministerial Intern.

The Board chose the third option as it is less expensive than the second, has the very real advantage of providing a focus point for our social justice activities, and supports the ministerial development needs of our faith. The intern, properly selected, would be with CUUF for two years, learn our fellowship, and provide much needed leadership for our social justice outreach to our community.

The Personnel budget does provide a \$3,697 decrease from last year in benefits expense due to the office assistant declining UUA health insurance as a lower cost alternative is available to her

Invest in Lay Leadership: Board Expense Category

The Board recognizes that growth means we need more capable leaders and placed a priority on investing in the quality and quantity of lay leadership resources within CUUF. This includes sending congregants to attend the UUA General Assembly in Spokane this year, and funding Unitarian Universalist Institute enrollment fees for leadership study groups.

Invest in CUUF Worship Activities: Worship Expense Category

A provision has been made for \$2,500 to provide an assisted hearing devices system for those in our Fellowship who are hearing impaired. This system will enable such individuals to more easily hear the Sunday Services.

Fund a Financial Reserve Fund: Strategic Plan Category

The Board set a goal of building a cash reserve equal to one year's operating expense over the next ten years. According, 10% of the projected expense budget, or \$23,358, has been set aside for that purpose.

Expense items that decrease in the proposed budget:

We are reducing facilities budget by \$6,511 due to a lower expected septic maintenance requirement, and the extraordinary expense of replacing the heat pump in the current year, which obviously is not expected to reoccur in the next fiscal year.

Thank you for reading all of this! I hope you take these goals to heart when you make your pledge. We are growing together – let's invest in our future.

CUUF BOARD UPDATE

The Board met March 13th for our regular March meeting.

We heard a presentation from Hand in Hand Immigration Services: Norma Gallegos, Gustavo Montoya and our own Larry Tobiska. The Board resolved to become the 501(c)(3) sponsor for Hand in Hand while they are applying for their 501(c)(3) status.

We reviewed the draft of the Congregational Covenant that was created by combining the original 4 that were crafted from our Covenant workshop. We approved the draft, and you will be hearing more about this before our June Congregational Meeting.

The Board voted to explore a bank loan to pay off the North Lot. That loan is coming due in a year. We have some time to determine how to best handle that obligation.

We entered into an agreement with Jeff Lau for bookkeeping services, after his term as Treasurer is completed. He has chosen to have the salary for that position be contributed to the Looking Toward the Future Fund.

Finally, we had some Board education on Becoming an Effective Ambassador and discussing reaching out to members of the congregation in conversation and appreciation.

CONGREGATONAL COVENANT

In November, the congregation came together to create four draft congregational covenants. Those covenants have now been worked into a draft form. The team who developed the draft tried to capture the spirit of all four drafts. The team consisted of Kmbris Bond, Steve Clem, Ben Knecht, Jeff Lau, Mary Madsen, and Rev. Laura. We will have a Town Hall meeting to present the covenant on Sunday, May 6 after the service. The final draft will be voted on at the Annual Congregational Meeting. BUDDHISTS' CORNER

Let True Dharma Continue By Sharon Meho Petit, Sensei and Todd Daiko Petit

On the bottom of my new brown rakusu are the words written by my Zen teacher, Genjo Marinello Roshi, *Let True Dharma Continue*. So, looking at this, and my new license to teach, I have been considering what Genjo Roshi meant.



In our newly acquired Stone Blossom Sangha Sutra Books I turned to the *Morning Dedication*. This is a recitation of all the Zen ancestors before Genjo and me.

It read:

Past, present, future, All Buddhas, Bodhisattvas, All Zenji Dai Osho, Let True Dharma Continue, Universal Sangha Relations become complete

I think Genjo Roshi is hinting at a completion of sorts. I have joined the ancestors in standing guard over the dharma that has been transmitted by our lineage. Dharma here means the universal truth common to all individuals, at all times, proclaimed by the Buddha and all the teachers since. It is not a property of any one sect of Buddhism or even Buddhism itself. It includes the truth of impermanence and no permanent individuated self. It is Buddha's good news that we are all It, Big Mind, the Cosmos Itself, originally pure. In short, we are all Buddhas already. Sadly, we just don't recognize this truth and continue suffering and causing harm to ourselves and others. My job is to hold the container of practice for those who come searching, so that they can see *This* for themselves.


Unitarian Universalism
