### A MESSAGE FROM REV. LAURA SHENNUM

Holy Curiosity...

"At times our own light goes out and is rekindled by a spark from another person. Each of us has cause to think with deep gratitude of those who have lighted the flame within us." - Albert Schweitzer



When I think of nurturing humanity, I think of what are the ways we help each other reach our full potential. How do we make room for everyone to feel loved? This means looking for ways to offer kindness; for ways to create a healthier society; for ways to treat each other with respect; and for ways to increase equity and equality for all. We will explore these ideas throughout our upcoming month.

One of the ways we care for each other is in our worship, specifically with our Joys and Sorrows. Recently, this specific ritual has taken up to 25 minutes of our worship time. The worship team and I are struggling to ensure we honor this space in our worship as well as honor those who have prepared elements of our worship service. We have had to shorten sermons or cancel music and this causes a gap in the message for that day. It causes worship leaders to feel stressed and creates discomfort for any guest speakers.

However, if we are truly taking the time to care for each other and nurture our community, then we also need to be mindful of those who have prepared the service. I ask you keep this in mind on Sunday mornings, not as a way to limit your sharing, but as a way to be intentional about your sharing.

These are the blessings we have to struggle with as we grow and continue to nurture our community. If you are finding a need to connect with others on a more regular basis, then please be sure to check out the description of covenant groups and clearness circles found in this newsletter.

### A MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD PRESIDENT

My fellow UUs,

Happy New Year! I am so looking forward to this next year with all of you as we plan and grow, worship and work together. We received the Financial Feasibility Study report from Kay Crider. It was emailed out, and printed copies are also available at the church. The report is very positive and lays out a potential course of action for us. After reviewing and discussing the report, the board envisions proceeding with the recommendations laid out on page 17:



- We will be asking the Architectural Task Force to go back to the architect to modify the facility plans to give us options for phase 1 that would fall within the projected capital campaign budget from the report; and
- We believe we should also engage with a local realtor who would continuously monitor the local commercial real estate market for potential church locations that may come available for purchase.

We look forward to engaging in discussion with you at a town hall style meeting on Sunday January 21st after the service. Please review the report and plan to attend this meeting to share your thoughts, questions, and concerns.

It is exciting to finally have some specifics, as it relates to improving our programming and facilities. We hope that everyone is energized and will remain engaged in this process over the upcoming months. I recently heard a quote from Julia Ward Howe, one of our Unitarian ancestors, who said, "I am confirmed in my division of human energies. Ambitious people climb, but faithful people build." I know in my soul that we are a faithful people. I have no doubt that together, we will continue to improve our fellowship, enrich our programs, and build our spiritual home. May it be so.

#### CUUF BOARD UPDATE

The Board met in regular session on December 11, 2017 and in a special session on December 14, 2017 for a discussion of the Financial Feasibility Study Report. Jameson O'Neil presented an update from the Safety Plan Review Committee, which is working on an overall safety plan for the congregation to include reaching out to local law enforcement for advice. With help from both Angela Morris and Jameson O'Neill, past CUUF president Rebecca Lyons has gathered together what has been called the "strongest Stewardship Committee ever" to begin work on the Stewardship Campaign. Thank you all! Also, thank you to the three people who volunteered to work on our Congregational Covenant and more help would be appreciated.

Jeff Lau and the Finance Committee will work on a policy that addresses situations in which a committee/team has a change in their requested budget amount and would like to use leftover funds for a project or expense that was not in the original budget plan. The Board will work on Open Questions to engage the congregation in thoughtful discernment on an ongoing basis.

The Board reviewed in depth the results of the Financial Feasibility Study Report and has decided to hold a Town Hall meeting on Sunday January 21 at noon so that the entire congregation could come together and fully discuss the report. The Report was emailed out to the congregation and copies are also available at CUUF.

### Covenant Groups/Clearness Circles

We have two small group programs available at Cascade UU.

The first is our Covenant Group program. This is a program for groups of 6-8 people, who meet regularly to explore topics as well as listen to each other in deep ways. The groups typically have a checkin, reflection, and a sharing of beliefs/thoughts on the offered reflection. These are not groups to offer counseling or advice. Rather they are meant to deepen listening to others as well as develop your own truth and meaning.

The second program is our Clearness Circles. These are based on the work of Parker Palmer and the idea each of us has an inner wisdom. The groups meet monthly to listen deeply to each other and help each other to tap into that inner wisdom. The groups are structured in a way where each person gets 15 minutes to explore a question or topic in their life while others listen. Others then ask questions to assist the person to find the answers within themselves. Group sizes range between 3-4 people. If you have a discomfort with holding silence, these groups will help you grow in that area.

### **BUDDHISTS' CORNER**

### Impermanence Sharon Meho Petit & Todd Daiko Petit

The death of one of Stone Blossom Sangha's founding members, Pat Brooke, brought me face to face again with Impermanence. It is happening more as I myself age. Friends and family members drop their body and I get a glimpse of my own impending death.

Pat was my friend and companion on the spiritual path from the moment we met at a Newcomer's Breakfast in 2002. We five, John Crew, Suzanne Harper, Pat and the two of us founded Stone Blossom Sangha. From the



time I met Pat, as the elder, I discovered she had much to teach me about life and the deeper reaches of our work maturing as human beings. We laughed and sweated building the CUUF meditation garden. We cried as we lost friends and companions on the path like Rocci Hildum. We worked to heal our sangha and the CUUF community after the suicide of the disrobed Soto priest, Drew. And a hug from Pat was a comfort to be experienced.

Pat Brooke was a belly dance student of mine (Meho) and a drum student of Daiko. She danced in a student belly dance troupe, along with Rita Salama, Rebecca Lyons and Carlie Siroky. Pat was definitely here and in the present moment. And I mourn my friend and will miss her in so many ways.

In Zen we say, 'never born, never die' to describe this great unfolding fabric we call life. And death is part of that fabric as a rose in winter is simply potential which is realized in Spring. But this doesn't mean we don't grieve, feel sadness at our loved one's death, or fear at the thought of our own end. As Pat Brooke said in our last conversation, "I just open, open and open to whatever comes, good or bad."

I gave one last promise to my friend and dharma sister, to say the ancient words of the Dai Segaki prayer and acknowledge her place as an ancestor of Stone Blossom Sangha. We will hold the Buddhist memorial service for Pat Brooke, Wednesday, January 31. You are invited to join us at 5:30 pm at 119 S Miller Street, Wenatchee. You may also join us any Wednesday at 5:30 pm for practice.

We will also be offering Beginning Zen Classes for those who want to learn more about this ancient spiritual path which seems to speak to so many in these times. The classes begin Sunday, January 14 and continue for eight weeks. We will meet from 2-3:30 pm, culminating in a special one-day Zen retreat with Genjo Marinello Osho. ### REGIONAL ASSEMBLY

Plan to join attendees from 185 PWR congregations as the four districts of the Pacific Western Region convene in Portland, Oregon, April 27-29, for the 2018 Regional Assembly. Three dynamic speakers will address the theme, *Stories of Hope, Courage, Resistance, and Resilience*. The Rev. Dr. William Barber, a national figure in civil rights activism, will be in the pulpit for Sunday's worship service. Saturday's keynote speaker will be Congresswoman Pramila Jayapal, the first Indian-American woman to be elected to U.S. Congress. Jayapal has spent the last twenty years working internationally and domestically as a leading advocate for women's, immigrant, civil, and human rights. The Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray, UUA president, will speak at Friday evening's opening ceremony. Frederick-Gray will share her emerging vision for the future of the UUA and the wider movement.

Several workshops will be offered during Saturday's programming. If you prefer, you may opt to participate in a local social justice activity. Full details about workshops and the social justice activity will soon be posted on the Pacific Western Region website (www.uua.org/pwr).

All four districts of the Pacific Western Region will hold concurrent annual meetings on Saturday afternoon. Meeting materials and delegate information will be distributed in February/March.

If you are a minister, religious educator, or music director you will want to attend the day-long Professional Day activities on Friday, April 27. Rev. Erika Hewitt, UUA staff Minister of Worship Arts, and Dr. Glen Thomas Rideout, Director of Worship and Music at the First Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Ann Arbor, will be presenting a workshop for religious professionals on multi-generational, multicultural worship. In addition, the Revs. Elizabeth Stevens, Emily Brault, and Susan Maginn will be presenting "From Burden to Blessing: Working with Secondary Trauma" for community-based ministers. Professional Day programming will be held at First Unitarian Church of Portland prior to the start of Regional Assembly. Registration for Friday's Professional Day will be available via the Regional Assembly registration form.

Regional Assembly registration will be open by January 4. You will be able to access full details and the registration form through the Pacific Western Region website (<a href="www.uua.org/pwr">www.uua.org/pwr</a>). The Portland DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel, site of the Regional Assembly, is offering discounted room rates

through March 29. You can reserve your room <u>here</u>. If you book through another link or by phone, be sure to use the group code, UU8. Full details will be posted on the PWR website before registration opens January 4.

PWR staff is working hard to keep registration costs low. An Early Bird adult registration fee will be available through January 31 and fees for young adults, youth, and children will be discounted. Still, could your congregation consider either subsidizing or fully funding the costs for at least one person to attend Regional Assembly? What a great opportunity for someone identified as a potential leader in your congregation!

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
### Unitarian Universalism
