A MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD PRESIDENT

Seek, Embrace, Serve

My dear friends,

What a joy it was to see so many of you at last Sunday's service — when Steve Clem and Deb Miller reminded us of the importance of the words and deeds of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King right now in our time. I remember a time, not so long ago, when on a holiday weekend, especially if the minister wasn't in the pulpit, that there would be more than a few empty seats. I attribute our increase in attendance to three factors: need, hard work and growth.



<u>First: our message</u>. Did you notice that on the same Sunday we had a predominantly secular worship service lifting up one of the great lights of our time, there was an announcement in the bulletin of a multi-week class lifting up one of the great lights of ancient times, offered by CUUF members Ben Knecht and Sandy Limbeck on "The Challenge of Jesus." As Unitarian Universalists we don't all find meaning in the same place but take a broad look at Six Sources: (1) direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder; (2) words and deeds of prophetic women and men; (3) wisdom from the world's religions; (4) Jewish and Christian teachings; (5) Humanist teachings; and (6) spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions. I am so grateful to have found a congregation that lives Rev. Dr. King's vision of Beloved Community – his global vision in which all people can share in the wealth of the earth. In the Beloved Community, poverty, hunger and homelessness will not be tolerated because international standards of human decency will not allow it. Racism and all forms of discrimination, bigotry and prejudice will be replaced by an all-inclusive spirit of sisterhood and brotherhood.

Here at CUUF we provide what people need: Beloved Community and a way to find your place in it.

<u>Second: hard work.</u> Our Worship team has been hard at work along with Rev. Laura, training, learning and experimenting with presenting meaningful and transformative worship for all ages. Thanks to the continuing efforts of our professional minister and our lay worship leaders, we have raised the bar so that the congregation can count on a terrific service on any given Sunday. What a gift! And the attendance shows that.

<u>Third: growth.</u> We now have 136 members in our Fellowship. Not so long ago we were skirting with 80, then 90 then 100 – and rising. Visitors, no, better yet, <u>seekers</u> come through our doors every week to see what we are about. They come from near and far to see if it is true that there is a welcoming, alive, liberal religious presence here in the Wenatchee Valley. I know for me that answer is yes – we are a welcoming, alive liberal religious presence that welcomes the wisdom and teachings of both the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Jesus and so many more.

So, let's say Yes, and.....

Yes, we have a message that is needed, yes, it takes hard work, and yes, we are growing into a Beloved Community, which is an alive, liberal religious presence here in the Wenatchee Valley.

CUUF BOARD UPDATE

The Board met on January 9 and the first item discussed was the new committee that will work on preparing the church and congregants for any emergency that could arise called the Safety Plan Committee. Vern Smith, Jameson O'Neal and Reverend Laura have been working on writing a charter for this important committee and will be seeking committee members soon.

The budget season has officially started for the 2018-2019 church year with the various committees and teams working on their budget goals for next year. One of the first items to be considered for the draft budget presented to the board was the list of financial goals that the Finance Committee recommends, and the board approved, based on the recent congregation discussions and survey focusing on programmatic goals. The next item up will be crafting the board budget goals.

During the Board's monthly education portion of the meeting, Jeff Lau presented an essay on "In Support for an Autonomous Board" for review and discussion. A lively discussion focused on questions including: How do we honor each other's varying opinion? How do we utilize opinions from consultants and discern the value and best choices for CUUF? Laura reviewed the board history for the past several years and Jeff encouraged the board to review the policies, covenants, and the work that has already been done by previous boards.

Finally there was much excitement and discussion at the board meeting of the upcoming Town Hall Meeting on January 21 after the service. Everyone is invited to come and have lunch and discuss the Financial Feasibility study. Bring your questions and an open mind!

A Mission Moment

The Unitarian Universalist Navigator's class was developed by Reverend Laura and has been taught through three classes to 27 congregants. It is a nine-month study of theology, history, religious literacy and social consciousness. Additionally, the human condition is explored to include death, forgiveness and joy. The goal is to deepen our understanding of Unitarian Universalism and personal beliefs.

Classes meet monthly for three hours and generally require several hours of reading or preparation by the students. Additionally, participants are expected to meet once per month in clearness circles. A question related to the current theme is presented and each member answers it while the others listen intently. After silently assimilating what was heard the listeners are permitted to comment or ask questions. The speaker then clarifies or answers the questions of the other members. This is a powerful way to learn about each other and oneself.

I particularly enjoyed the historical and religious sessions. To understand our evolution from Christianity to Humanism, and then sense a return to spirituality affirmed Unitarian Universalism as a faith. And the heroes – so flawed yet courageous. Truly the stuff of Greek myth! Sincerely, the most impactful moments always came when we shared our thoughts on our own humanity. I pondered the prophetic voice, forgiveness and death for months beyond the sessions. The insights I gained motivated me to continue religious study. Judging by the 5 out of 6 members of our class that went on to the UU Explorer group, I was not the only one to be so inspired.

RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

Greetings!

I am so giddy with excitement that our young people - K-5th graders and the Youth Group - have been so involved in our congregation the last few months. I hope you all are enjoying getting to know them better, and seeing what I see when I am connected with them. What wise, thoughtful, silly, and intelligent young people we have here!

Coming up in RE: February introduces our fourth Unitarian Universalist Principle, a free and responsible search for truth and meaning, through the story of Egbert Ethelred Brown, a Jamaican man who converted to Unitarianism. Though he experienced many hardships to fulfill his calling to the Unitarian ministry, Brown devoted his life to inviting others to learn about our free faith. In the first session the children will explore the basics of a Unitarian theology. They engage in their own search for truth and meaning and investigate the concept of a call to ministry. We add the sign-post "Seek Truth" to our Faithful Journeys Path.

Our faith not only allows but also supports us to question, to seek answers, and to reevaluate our answers by posing new questions. To explore our fourth Unitarian Universalist Principle, our second session draws particularly on our fifth Source, humanist teachings that counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science. We demonstrate that the search for truth and meaning is an ongoing quest. The children learn about Clyde Tombaugh, the Unitarian Universalist man who discovered Pluto, and the decision in 2006 to change Pluto's status from planet to dwarf planet. The children will experience the relative scale of the planets in an activity with modeling dough. We will add the signpost "Ask Questions" to our Faithful Journeys Path.

Keep a look out for our "COIN JAR" for collecting spare change to raise money for the Wenatchee Valley Humane Society. This is the first project by the Faithful Journeys Action Club! Please help fill the jar!

In our Youth Group we will be exploring and discussing the six sources of Unitarian Universalist Living Tradition, and the idea of spiritual authority. Later we'll be learning about the sacred texts of many different religions, including the Bible, and have a chance to create their own sacred text. I am looking forward to some deep thinking in the coming month!

BUDDHISTS' CORNER

No Self Sharon Meho Petit & Todd Daiko Petit

Wherever I turn these days I am reminded of Buddhism's most profound and hardest truth. That there is no permanent self. This truth is hard for us to understand. We all believe from the time we are a toddler that we are a separate, permanent self. And, certainly when we pinch our leg or arm, we feel it, and that affirms our belief, and our memories tend to reinforce that sense of self.

On PBS a few months ago, I watched a program on neuro-biology. The researcher stated that our sense of who we are is based on memories and that our memories are not necessarily true. They are changeable. He discussed evidence



that we change memories all the time to fit new circumstances that arise. One example he offered was of a conversation he had with a couple he admired and believed were made for each other. After the same couple broke up his memory changed to say that his original impression was wrong and that he saw the signs of impending trouble that evening in the same conversation. Human beings do this all the time. If you don't believe it, just ask what a sibling remembers about a favorite event from your childhood. Just this last week I experienced this with my sister-in-law when I posted a picture on Facebook. The picture was clearly marked as having been taken in the 1970's at our home in Kirkland. My sister-in-law commented how well she remembered this gathering right after her parents had both died and we were sharing wonderful memories in the photo. Her parents died in 1988 and 1998. Hummm...

Thich Nhat Hahn writes most eloquently about the doctrine of Anatman or No-Self. He says, Impermanence is the same as non-self. Since phenomena are impermanent they do not possess a permanent identity. Non-self is also empty. Empty of a permanent self. Non-self also means inter-being. Because everything is made of everything else, nothing can be by itself alone. Non-self is also interpenetration, because everything contains everything else. Non-self is also interdependence, because this is made of that. Each thing depends on all other things to be, that is interdependence. Nothing can be by itself alone, it has to inter-be with all other things. That is non-self.

The Morning Meditation Group has had the great privilege this last year of sitting with Dr. Bob Anderson, one of the founders and proponents of the Christian Process Theology. This theology proposes we are all Process, from birth to death, expressing the energy that is the Cosmos or God. We are all the Process of *It* expressing Itself.

We will also be offering Beginning Zen Classes for those who want to learn more about this ancient spiritual path which seems to speak to so many in these times. Keynote speaker on Saturday, April 28, will be Congresswoman Pramila Jayapal. Jayapal is the first Indian-American woman to be elected to the U.S. Congress. Before being elected to represent Washington State's 7th District in 2016, Congresswoman Jayapal was an immigration and labor activist in Seattle. Her writing has been featured in The New York Times and The Nation. She has been written about in Mother Jones as well as many other publications.

Worship service on Sunday, April 29, will be led by the Rev. Dr. William Barber. As an NAACP leader and civil rights activist in North Carolina, Barber led the "Moral Mondays" protests in that state beginning in 2013. The founder of Repairers of the Breach, an organization formed to train religious leaders across the country in social justice work, Barber is currently leading a new "Poor People's Campaign." His most recent book is *The Third Reconstruction: Moral Mondays, Fusion Politics, and the Rise of a New Justice Movement*.

Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray, the newly elected president of the Unitarian Universalist Association, will speak to us to share her emerging vision for the future of the UUA and our wider movement.

In addition to these three speakers during the Regional Assembly, on Friday, April 27, immediately before the regional assembly, we also have two workshops for religious professionals. Rev. Erika Hewitt and Dr. Glen Thomas Rideout will be presenting a workshop for ministers, religious educators, and music directors, on multi-generational, multicultural worship. Hewitt is a UUA staff member serving as the Minister of Worship Arts and is the editor of Braver/Wiser, a weekly spirituality series, while Rideout has served as Director of Music at First Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Ann Arbor for the past eleven years. There will also be a development day for Community Ministers on Working with Secondary Trauma, led by Emily Brault, a UU minister and full-time Chaplain at the women's prison of the Oregon Department of Corrections; Susan Maginnis a UU minister and a chaplain with the US Navy; and Elizabeth Stevens, minister of the UU Church of the Palouse in Moscow, ID.


Unitarian Universalism
